December – April	Talk with your parents about completing the FAFSA online after January 1.	File financial aid forms by Internet or mail as soon as possible after January 1.
	Once you have received your college acceptances, make your final choice and send letters of acceptance and decline other offers by May 1.	Talk over options with your child and make sure all colleges have been notified by May 1.*
